Catholic Housing Services (formerly Archdiocesan Housing Authority) (206) 328-5731 www.ccsww.org	Shelter and transitional programs for homeless and low-income persons.
ArtSpace Projects (206) 271-0380 www.artspaceusa.org	Nonprofit developer of affordable live-work space for artists.
Building Changes (206) 322-9444 www.buildingchanges.org	A Seattle-based nonprofit that develops HIV/AIDS housing locally and provides technical assistance nationally.
Capitol Hill Housing (206) 329-7303 www.chhip.org	Offers secure, comfortable and affordable housing for individuals and families across a broad range of incomes.
Central Area Development Association (CADA) (206) 328-2240 www.cada.org	Affordable multifamily apartments, mixed used developments and community programs in the Central Area.
Compass Housing Alliance (merger of LATCH and the Compass Center) (206) 789-1536 www.latch.org	Builds safe and nurturing communities that recognize the right to affordable housing, the importance of self-determination, and the value of mutual respect.
Delridge Neighborhoods Development Association (DNDA) (206) 923-0917 www.dnda.org/housing	Affordable housing resource program, offering housing that is less expensive than for-profit buildings so that families with lower incomes can always live in Delridge
Downtown Emergency Service Center (206) 464-1570 www.desc.org	Serve disabled and vulnerable homeless adults, providing a variety of housing options, which all include case management and/or on-site coordination of support services.
Habitat for Humanity of Seattle/South King County (206) 292-5240 www.seattle-habitat.org	A homeownership program with homeowners investing hundreds of hours of labor (sweat equity) into building their Habitat house and pay a no-profit, no-interest mortgage.
Homesight (206) 760-4200 www.homesightwa.org	A homeownership program offering home buyer education classes, counseling and purchase assistance loans to first time homebuyers.
Homestead Community Land Trust (206) 323-1227 www.homesteadclt.org	A homeownership program offering assistance to help low- and moderate-income clients purchase their first homes. The land remains in trust, resale price is capped and homes must be sold to low-income clients or back to the agency.
Housing Resources Group (HRG) (206) 623-0506 www.hrg.org	A nonprofit organization meeting the region's affordable housing needs by developing and managing quality, safe and permanent affordable housing.
Inter*Im Community Development Association (206) 624-1802 www.interimicda.org	Affordable housing development in Seattle's International District and the larger Asian/Pacific community
Low Income Housing Institute (LIHI) (206) 443-9935 www.lihi.org	Develops, owns and operates housing for the benefit of low-income and homeless families and individuals
Mt. Baker Housing Association (206) 725-4152 www.mtbakerhousing.org	Owns and operates apartments in the Rainier Valley for low-income persons, mostly with Section 8 rental assistance.
Plymouth Housing Group (PHG) (206) 374-9409 www.plymouthhousing.org	Providing affordable housing and supportive services to people in transition from city streets to permanent homes.
Seattle Chinatown International District Preservation and Development Authority (SCIDPDA) (206) 624-8929 www.scidpda.org/housing	Provides opportunities for low to moderate-income individuals, families, and seniors to afford a safe and decent place to live in the heart of the bustling Chinatown International District, near the city center and city jobs.
Seattle Housing Authority (SHA) (206) 615-3300 www.seattlehousing.org	Provides low-income housing and Section 8 housing vouchers.
SouthEast Effective Development (SEED) (206) 723-7333 www.seedseattle.org	A not-for-profit community development corporation concerned with affordable housing, economic development, arts and cultural programs.
YWCA (206) 461-4888 www.ywcaworks.org	Owns and operates permanent and transitional low-income apartments for women and their families. Also has an employment and daycare center in downtown Seattle.
